p5; less good to read about the decline in the condition of The Black Dog premises and the continuing uncertainty about its future, p4.



Dog Poo Bin

Further to discussions at the May Parish Council about meeting the inadequate size of the dog poo bin at Lower Mooray, a larger all-purpose bin has been purchased. This bin is now in situ for dog walkers to use. There are three other bins in the village that can be used for dog waste; one by the Playing Field entrance at Claybush, one by the bus-stop in The Street and one by the layby opposite The Black Dog. An additional one has also been purchased for Forbes Field.

Black Dog Update

The warmer, sunnier weather has undoubtedly brought increased feelings of loss regarding our closed pub. Although we are no further forward with a purchase there are a few updates, as follows:



- The concern about rat activity at the pub was reported to The Black Dog's owner before Christmas and has got noticeably worse, encroaching on neighbouring properties. Wiltshire Pest Control came out to review the situation in May, discussing the activity seen along the road and on our properties. A report was sent to the Environmental Health Officer. There is no update regarding their success in getting hold of the owner.
- 2. The spiky weeds overgrowing the footpath running alongside the pub garden has also been reported to the estate agents, who passed the message on to the owner on 7 June.
- 3. There are many concerns regarding the state of the listed building. The first step in the process of reporting this is via Wiltshire Council, which we did earlier in the year. We are following up on what step two looks like now. If we need messages of concern from the village to strengthen our case, then we shall be in touch!
- 4. Two more local pubs have come onto the market this year: The Wyndham Arms, Dinton (£375k) and The Benett Arms, Tisbury. The latter appears to have sold at auction for £450k via Savills. Following these pubs coming on the market at a significantly lower price than the The Black Dog, the BD estate agents were contacted to supply a justification for their value on our pub. We note that the asking price for the pub has since been reduced from £550k to £495k.
- 5. A significant grant potentially available to us, subject to application, is the Community Ownership Fund; all applications to this have been paused until after the General Election, at which point there may be a whole new process. Therefore, subject to the availability of a similar grant pot, we shall need to wait for this to be clarified before applying, should we be successful at negotiating a suitable price for the increasingly dilapidated building.

Chilmark and Dinton have been cricket foes for more than 180 years. It's been turbulent. It's been combative. Sometimes the teas haven't been up to scratch. But it's

never been dull. Even when it rains. The away game toards the end of May would ultimately fall victim to the weather but, before it did, there was time for Brand King to run teammate Ricky Corbin out. Struggling for form, King was keen to scamper as many runs as possible and, in his desperation, vastly overestimated Corbin's ability to traverse 22 yards in a timely fashion. His innings terminated, and none too pleased, Corbin then played the shot of the day when he drop kicked his batting glove over the boundary line from short third man. Max Allen made headway in between downpours, as the uncovered pitch began to resemble a 70s six yard box. When he was stumped for 33, King finally began to find the middle of the bat, eventually registering a half century. James Stevenson then took over and made one of his own. 175 seemed decent in the conditions but with the innings break came more rain, and eventually it was decided that the pool table at the Wyndham was more inviting.

Good friends the Douglas Jardines travelled down from London the following weekend to play their part in a Darren Lee showcase. Batting first, Chilmark opened with father son duo Ben and Fitch Eastmond, with the youngster playing staunchly for three overs before finally losing his wicket. Brand King then joined Eastmond senior (19), the pair putting on a 54-run partnership for the second wicket. Eastmond made way for Tony Lewis (0), who lasted two balls, before Jovin Mann came to the crease. The youngster's sole aim was to score his first run for the club, which he managed with a delightful drive through the covers. He celebrated this arrival as a future Chilmark lynchpin in symbolic style - lifting a ball over square leg for six and knocking Admiral Middleton's walking stick out of his hand. By this time, King had reached his half century and looked like going all the way until he somehow managed to kick a ball on to his stumps. But this only paved the way for Darren Lee. In a blistering 42 ball knock, Lee cracked 13 boundaries and a six, as he registered an unbeaten 74, and helped Chilmark to a healthy total of 210.

Douglas Jardine were always on par with the required run rate but regular wickets kept Chilmark in the hunt. Rich Mann (1-5) bowled five exceptional overs, while Jovin Mann (1-17) showed he was an all-round talent. Carl Jacobs dropped a sitter, of course, because that's what he does but when the going got tough, Ben Eastmond (2-32) and Sam Moss (3-12) stepped up. However, it was Darren Lee's day. Chilmark's all-time leading wicket taker took one with his first and last deliveries of the game, registering his 150th for the club, and sealing a 58-run victory.

Chilmark CC 210-5 (D Lee 74*; B King 62) defeated Douglas Jardine CC 152 all out (S Moss 3-12; D Lee 2-29)

The Lobsters were next up at Cleeves Farm; Reg Allen was wheeled out for the occasion. It marked his 201st game for Chilmark, a total that says more about week-by-week player availability than any tangible talent on Reg's behalf. He was bowled for a duck. Ricky Corbin (9), Ed Lewis (10) and Darren Lee (20) all made starts; however, it was an unlikely hero that settled the innings. Ben Fowles' best years are surely behind him but for an hour and a half he swatted and caressed his way to a convincing half century. Max Allen blasted by him on his

way to yet another century but the 150-run partnership they put on gave Chilmark the upper hand.

Chasing 256, the Lobsters were never really in the hunt. Darren Lee (2-22) struck early, before Ricky Corbin took two of his own. The highlight, though, was the return to Cleeves Farm of Windmill Will. It had been five years since the Chilmark icon with the idiosyncratic bowling action had taken a wicket for the club but he made up for that in style, striking with his first ball. As if that wasn't enough, he then removed the Lobsters' best batsman, and effectively sealed the deal for Chilmark. Ever the trendsetter, that first ball wicket became a theme. Sam Moss struck with his, on the way to three for the princely sum of no runs, before Patrick 'the Doc' Craig-McFeely rounded off the innings with his loosener.

Chilmark CC 256-6 (Max Allen 102*; B Fowles 71) defeated The Lobsters CC 122 (S Moss 3-0; R Corbin 2-16)

What happened the following weekend is hard to describe.

Two teams, the Old Somervillians and the Fulham Pigeons, visited Chilmark for a triangular T20 tournament that was equal parts chaos and cricket. Music played the batsmen on, players played for a team, then against it, Archie Small offered commentary via an amplified microphone. For Chilmark, Jonny Sanderson (36) finally got to spend some time in the middle as he top-scored against the Pigeons. Ably assisted by Mac Stevenson (26), Darren Lee (24) and Will Packer (27*), Chilmark put on 127. Sam Moss (3-6) was the chief Pigeon killer, with Rocket Stevenson (2-11) also taking some feathers. Chilmark ran out 30 run winners.

Given the Pigeons' general ineptness, the game between Chilmark and the Old Somervillians became a pseudo final. The Somervillians batted first and, courtesy of an 83run partnership between Sam and Will (now playing against Chilmark) Packer, put an imposing 152 run total on the board. Rocket (2-31) was Chilmark's best. The home

team fell behind the run rate early on, until Max Allen (30) hit three consecutive sixes, followed by a boundary. But when he was bowled next ball, hopes faded. Rocket kept things together as best he could while batting partners came and went but, as the 19th over began, Chilmark still needed another 44 to win. It's unclear how many deliveries were sent down in that 19th over, or how many hit the pitch. There were free hits, penalty runs, wides, sixes, no balls and, 35 runs later, a run out. The final over saw Chilmark suddenly needing nine to win. Alas, try as Carl Jacobs and the Doc might, they could not quite get the team over the line. The Old Somervillians, unsurprisingly, won their fixture against the Pigeons and took home a well-deserved trophy.



Coming up, we have home games on 7 and 28 July, and then every Sunday through to 1 September. And, on a yet to be confirmed date in August, it's outdoor movie time as we set up a large screen and projector, break out the popcorn and BBQ, and open up the ground to the village for a night of family entertainment. Gardening Tips

We welcome the third of in our series of monthly pieces from Josie Nunn of Chilmark Horticultural Society (an affiliate of the RHS).

It's really important in the hot summer months to keep watering newly planted trees and plants. Remember that tubs and baskets dry out very quickly. Fruiting crops like tomatoes, chillies and cucumbers should be fed weekly with a liquid feed high in potassium. Feeds high in nitrogen promote leafy growth, so are good for brassicas.

July is the month to prune long shoots on wisteria back to about seven buds, and shoots that have flowered on ceanothus can be cut back by a third. Hardy geraniums can be cut back to encourage new growth and a second flush of flowers.

Please leave hedge trimming as late in August as possible and check carefully for nests before you start. Blackbirds, thrushes and goldfinches, in particular, are still nesting in August. On the subject of wildlife, please do keep bird baths clean and topped up, and our hedgehog friends will appreciate a dish of clean water at ground level. If you'd like to attract more butterflies, plants like eryngium, lavender, scabious and echinacea are good choices. Remember, many butterflies like to lay their eggs in patches of nettles, so don't be too tidy! Children may like to make a small wildlife pond or an insect house during the summer holidays there are lots of ideas on the internet.

We hope your gardens bring you lots of pleasure this summer. Josie Nunn

The challenges that lie ahead

Over the last five editions of the Village Voice, I really hope that readers have gained some insights into the *business* of our beautiful church. That, unapologetically, is my perspective on it and I readily accept that religious matters are not my thing. The Salisbury Diocese has 432 small parishes. We can't say that the Diocese actually manages them, individually, as there is such a very light management touch. Each parish is really left to manage itself. However, individually and collectively, the challenges that are faced are quite stark. Demonstrably, we have diminishing congregations and an ageing church-going population. It isn't harsh to look to the future but actually very necessary. The Diocese has encouraged parishes to look for solutions. We might wish to be given more direction, but nothing has been forthcoming. There has been talk of merging parishes but currently there is no desire for this from most parishes in the Diocese. A merger of PCCs is a challenging concept and, to use the cliché, the devil really is in the detail. We are likely to see our benefice split into two. That isn't obviously more efficient, although it might prove to be more attractive in terms of retention of, and recruitment of, clergy.

If we look forward even two or three years, let alone ten years, the future needs much more radical thought. There will be a need for aggregation. There are far fewer Roman Catholic churches in any given area and that simple fact means that they face fewer of these simple issues of oversupply. There are just too many churches in any given Diocese and surely that is an indisputable fact. Yet, every parishioner is so very wedded to their own church. How to square this circle?

These issues will (eventually) be addressed and debated by your PCC. There may come some direction nationally or perhaps from our Salisbury Diocese. In the meantime, as a PCC, we will continue to manage the two competing demands on our limited funds. Tisbury Surgery News

As I write, there is at long last a glimpse of sun – so just a reminder to remember your sunscreen and hat – and to remind you how getting out and doing some exercise is good both for your mental wellbeing as well as blood pressure and cholesterol levels.

Do keep a look out for ticks if walking in long grass though. Their bite is not always painful, and you may not notice a tick unless you see it on your skin. Do check for ticks on your clothes and skin as well as your children and pets after being outdoors.

It is easy to remove a tick - use fine-tipped tweezers or a tick-removal tool. You can buy these from some pharmacies, vets, pet shops or a well-known supplier via the internet. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible and slowly pull upwards, taking care not to squeeze or crush the tick. Dispose of it when you have removed it and clean the bite with antiseptic or soap and water. The chance of getting ill from a tick bite is low. You do not need to do anything else unless you notice a rash or become unwell.

On another note, one of our patients, Viv Worrall, (we have her consent to give her details) and Rosie, our practice manager, are planning to tackle 24 peaks (including Scafell Pike England's highest mountain) in 24 hours in September in an attempt to raise much needed funds for Julia's House Children's Hospice. The hospice receives very little Government funding (8%) and relies hugely on donations.

Celebrating Chase & Chalke


